THE LATE PROFESSOR HAYSACK.

We deeply regret to announce the death, at the early age of 47, of Professor Haysack, which sad event took place on Friday, May 13, at his residence, 52, Talbot-road, Bayswater. As one of the foremost teachers of Oratory in this country, the news of his demise will come as a severe shock to a large circle of friends in the Metropolis, and indeed throughout England, for he numbered among his pupils many distinguished members of the clerical, the legal, and the theatrical professions. The deceased gentleman was the son of a celebrated divine of Manchester, who was in his day considered a brilliant orator and deep thinker. Professor Haysack was a man whose loss to educational literature will be well-nigh irreparable, for he inherited his father's gifts of both intellect and eloquence, and was equally successful in the fields of oratory, elocution, and literature. As a teacher he had few rivals, some of the most prominent Members of both Houses of Parliament being his pupils. Having made a great reputation in the provinces, Professor Haysack was, some twelve years ago, prevailed upon by several distinguished public men to come to London, so that his talents might have a wider sphere. This step neither he, nor those who benefited so greatly by his teaching, had cause to regret—a fact which the enthusiastic eulogiums he received from all who came under the spell of his influence abundantly testified. Professor Haysack leaves a widow and three daughters to mourn his premature death, and to receive the sympathy of friends in their bereavement. All the three daughters have already given proof of inherited talent in the musical and dramatic world.
